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Background on Israel's Arab Population

 Israel has 1.2 million Arab citizens (about 20% of the population)

- The population is young:51% are below age 19
- The Arab population in highly concentrated geographically (mostly in small towns and villages)
- The daily language is Arabic (not Hebrew)
- . Most of the Arabs are Muslim

- Nutritional patterns (daily nutritional habits, traditional hospitality)
- Language (spoken/literary, translation)
